

MINUTES OF THE ANNUAL MEETING OF ELECTORS OF THE PARISH OF NORTH HORSHAM HELD ON MONDAY 22nd APRIL 2024 AT 7.30pm AT ROFFEY MILLENIUM HALL, CRAWLEY ROAD, HORSHAM

The Annual Parish Meeting started at 7.00pm with refreshments and an opportunity to talk to members of the Parish Council. The main meeting started at 7.30pm.

Present at the Meeting were five members of the public, Parish Councillors Britten, Davidson, Davidson-Fernandez, Gough, Raby, Smithurst, Turner and Wilton, guest speakers Mr Phillip Gibbs (Chairman of Roffey Football Club (RFC)), Tom Barnes (Chairman of Roffey Cricket Club (RCC)), Sarah Norman (Clerk to the Council) and Lisa Underwood (Deputy Clerk).

MINUTES

In the chair: Cllr A Britten - Chairman of North Horsham Parish Council.

- 1. The Chairman welcomed everyone in attendance. Apologies had been received from Cllrs K Burgess, P Burgess, Rickett, Searle & Torn.
- 2. The Minutes of the Annual Meeting of Electors of the Parish held on 24th April 2023 were signed by the Chairman as being a true record of the meeting.
- 3. The Chairman presented the Annual Report of the Parish Council for 2023/24 which was available in hard copy and on the Parish Council website www.northhorsham-pc.gov.uk.
- 4. The Chairman welcomed Mr Phillip Gibbs, Chairman of RFC.

Mr Gibbs gave a presentation about the activities and future plans of RFC, which can be seen in Appendix A. Mr Gibbs confirmed that, along with other North Horsham Clubs, they had been invited to operate the new Mowbray sports facility, which was an exciting prospect. RFC will still also be operating from their current site.

Questions from the floor were asked and Mr Gibb answered the questions summarised as follows:

- A nearby resident advised that they do get asked for directions to RFC and asked if there were plans to have any direction signs in the surrounding area. Mr Gibbs advised that they are going to look into that as the club is getting bigger.
- Mr Gibbs confirmed that there were various teams, such as the 1st team, U18's, U23's and 3 veteran teams.

The Chairman thanked Mr Gibbs for his presentation.

The Chairman then welcomed Mr Tom Barnes, Chairman of RCC.

Mr Barnes gave a presentation about the activities and future plans of RCC, which can be seen in Appendix B.

Questions from the floor were asked and Mr Barnes answered the questions summarised as follows:

- The boar logo for both clubs is historic and relates to where both clubs used to share a site, which used to be a slaughterhouse.
- Professional cricket players tend not to play for the club and go elsewhere in the county.
- Girls and women are being recruited to play cricket from Horsham Rugby Club and those associated with the cricket club through partners and siblings etc. The club is also looking at their connections with Bohunt School to recruit more players and to be able to use the new facilities at Mowbray, when they become available.
- 5. The Chairman then opened the floor for any questions from the attendees, detailed below:
 - A resident has been in discussions with Network Rail and Councillors from Horsham District Council and West Sussex County Council (WSCC) regarding the condition of the footpath that runs from Treadcroft Drive to Bluebell Close (Chennells Way), Horsham. The footpath provides access across the railway line, via two stiles, to the local amenities on both sides of the track as well as green spaces. The surface of the footpath is predominately mud with a small amount of hard surfacing at the Treadcroft Drive entrance, which appears to be an existing path. The footpath is also attracting anti social behaviour.

Network Rail cut back the undergrowth and made some small improvements to the stiles with a promise to do more. WSCC advised that they will only maintain urban PROWs that are made surfaces, i.e. asphalt or slab. If the surface is unmade and it is in a condition that requires maintenance then in the first instance it would need to be referred to the relevant PROW officer, which was done.

It was suggested a community highways scheme could be looked into.

The resident would like any support and advice from the Parish Council. Cllr Turner advised that this matter can be added to a future Planning, Environment & Transport agenda for discussion.

 A resident commented on Bartholemew Way bus shelter and the missing panels and asked if the Parish Council are due to maintain the shelter and replace the panels. The Deputy Clerk confirmed that this shelter was due to be painted this year and we will look at getting the roof cleaned as well. The Property Committee did consider replacing the panels last year, but did not agree to do so as historically the panels are damaged frequently and there are insufficient funds to keep replacing them.

After thanking all those who had attended, and there being no other business, the Chairman closed the meeting at 8.29pm.






Pitches 1 & 2

- Ageing clubhouse, high utility costs and improvements in security




Future Plans
